MESSAGE FROM FR ALBAN

Dear Parishioners,

During the month of November, we pray for the Holy Souls. At both St. Luke's and St. Bernadette's you will find a box into which you are invited you to put names of loved ones which you would like to be placed on the altar and prayed for at Mass during November. Holy Souls envelopes are also available for you to put in your intentions, especially if you would like a Mass to be said for a loved one.

In today's gospel Jesus reminds us of the two most important commandments of all: 'love God and love your neighbour.' Many of us find the first commandment easier than the second. God's very remoteness from us makes him more easily loveable. He does not elbow his way into our lives. He is not always sticking his nose into our business. It is we who come banging on his door when we need help. Otherwise, he keeps his distance. Our neighbour is so often just the opposite.

'Love your neighbour as yourself.' This can be a problem if we don't like ourselves very much. If we don't love ourselves, if we suffer from low self-esteem, how can we love someone else? On the other side of the coin if we are so full of ourselves and think the world revolves around us we have no room to love anyone. It is also difficult to allow yourself to love and be loved if you've been hurt in the past.

Our me-centred culture also makes keeping this commandment difficult, where everything is judged by whether it's fun for me. According to that philosophy it is easy to dump those who love us if they don't suit us. It is me that matters.

At the Last Supper Jesus washed his disciples' feet and as he did so he told them 'I give you a new commandment, love one another as I have loved you.' As I have loved you – can any of us hand on heart say that we know what this really means?

Each of us can probably think of someone whose love has changed our lives, someone who sticks by us through thick and thin, who has given as a glimpse of what God's love is like.

Those two commandments belong together. Wholehearted love of God finds its fullest expression in love of neighbour. When we practice love of neighbour, our love for God becomes deeper and more intense.

None of us is perfect. We are not angels. We are bound to hurt and wound one another. I live in a community of monks - people are often surprised that we too have our falling outs and our arguments. You soon learn that if someone is annoying you, then you most certainly annoy them. We have our whole lives to learn how to love God and how to love our neighbour, but the vital thing is not to think that the two things can be separated from one another. As St John puts it very plainly in one of his letters: 'those who do not love a brother or sister whom they have seen cannot love God whom they have not seen.'

BRIDGE FOR YOUNG PEOPLE (FORMERLY YPACF)

As we switch our support to a new charity, I wanted to let you know how much we raised for our previous charity. The final amount of £9,500 due was paid over this week, which covers fund-raising, individual donations, Friday Self-Denial donations and St B's 100 Club money raised over the past 15 months or so.

This means that over the last $4\frac{1}{2}$ years we raised a total of £23,900 and, in addition to this, the parish has donated £15,000 out of its funds, so a total of £38,900 has been donated. Congratulations and well done to everyone who gave their support!

NEW ENCYCLICAL LETTER

Dilexit Nos – He Loved Us – is Pope Francis' fourth encyclical. With this document, the Pope proposes a new reflection on the love of Christ represented in His Holy Heart. He calls for a renewal of "authentic devotion" to the Sacred Heart, recalling that in the Heart of Christ "we find the whole Gospel".
